Letter from the PiELL President

Dear PiELL Friends,

The first known structural fire in the U.S. was in 1608 in the Jamestown Colony, and it destroyed much of the town. By 1680 in New York, the number of fire buckets in each building was regulated depending on the fire risk. Bakers, for example, had to have three buckets. To fight the fires, people worked together forming bucket brigades. You've seen the pictures; people in a line pass buckets from person to person so that many buckets travel quickly to the fire. It works much better than individuals running and spilling water.

Probably like most of you, I have not stood shoulder to shoulder with others passing buckets of water to fight a fire. But it is likely that all of us have seen the impact when many people are involved in an effort, and each has an important but not overwhelming role. It is this healthy concept that we embrace at PiELL.

Two people who have worked together putting out lots of fires at PiELL are Judi Kreinick and Nancy Guenther. I am thrilled that they will soon get a little relief from their years of hard work (see more on that below).

We welcome Annie Haymaker to our board and are excited to have her play a larger role on our team. She answered a call several months ago to assist Louise Beesley in the library and has been a great help.

stories about our families, and sharing our interests and feelings about ideas. We worked on speaking and pronunciation, then reading and writing. It was a joy to work with her. Jinda progressed well and focused on her goal of becoming an American citizen, which she reached in 2014. She and her husband own a business. Jinda is an active participant in the life of our community.

As a tutor with PiELL, I feel a sense of satisfaction in having helped make positive changes in someone's life. The friendship that has developed between Jinda and myself is so very special to me. Our official tutoring sessions have ended, but our friendship and monthly luncheons will go on.

My student Ramon has a landscaping business that he built up through referrals from existing customers. He is married and has 5 children. Ramon and I have been working together to improve his English language skills for the past seven years. His English language level when we began was at the beginner level.

Using the "English, No Problem" curriculum, Ramon has completed books 1 and 2 and is just beginning book 3. His latest Language Skills assessment results placed him at the advanced level in the four oral language sections, oral dictation and reading comprehension. His written language skills are at the elementary level. We have focused on vocabulary development including reinforcement and review at the beginning of each lesson. Ramon has demonstrated proficiency in correctly defining more than 400 vocabulary words.

Presently we are meeting about twice a month on average due to periodic work schedule conflicts. Ramon is a pleasure to work with. He is enthusiastic, hard working and confident in his ability to progress in developing his language skills.
